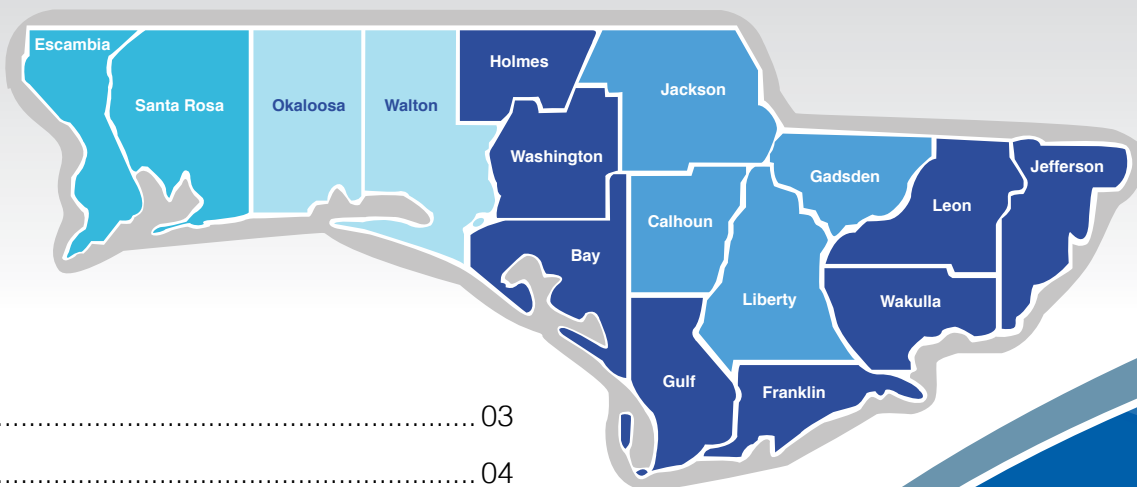

A Message From Board Chair – Sally Gertz

I am amazed at the number of major issues Legal Services of North Florida faced and tackled in 2015. Two long-time leaders of LSNF were scheduled for retirement in 2016 and the board worked with the Executive Director to ensure a smooth transition.

Facing the retirement of Kris Knab, our executive director for the last 22 years, the board identified an internal candidate, Senior Attorney Leslie Powell, who began acquainting herself with the details of the position. That led to a contract in spring 2015 to promote her to deputy director, which allowed for a year's overlap, after which Leslie would then assume the position of executive director upon Kris' retirement in August 2016.

Under Kris' and Leslie's leadership, the job description for program administrator was modified and LSNF hired a highly experienced IT staff person to continue the great work of Javan Ferguson, a 39-year employee of LSNF, who was responsible for many complicated tasks of the organization.

Funding challenges were also a big issue in 2015 with reductions from our two general support sources—the Legal Services Corporation and the Florida Bar Foundation. Local governmental entities, fortunately, stepped up to the plate in Leon and Escambia Counties and the City of Tallahassee to ensure their constituents had access to the courts. Several new specialized grants were also successfully obtained to help LSNF serve the needs of children, disaster victims, people facing loss of their homes and sexual violence victims. On top of that, LSNF sponsored its first Jazz for Justice in Pensacola!

Additionally, the program was reaching its 40th anniversary in 2016, which required significant planning in 2015. The Board of Directors approved a plan to hold a 40th Anniversary Luncheon prior to the 20th Jazz for Justice event in Tallahassee in April.

So often board service is regarded as an opportunity for individuals to make contributions to the community or the organization they are serving. In the 15-plus years that my husband Marc and I have been involved with LSNF, we have become exceedingly appreciative of all the contributions and enrichments the organization has given to us!

If you are reading this and contemplating starting a relationship with LSNF, I urge you to continue. I have received so much by giving back to this organization and I know you will as well.

A Message from Executive Director - Kris Knab

For the last 38 years, Legal Services of North Florida (LSNF) has been a big part of my life. When I began with the organization as a young attorney, my goal was to improve the lives of low-income clients who face very difficult challenges. I wanted to use my legal expertise to join with other staff and volunteer attorneys committed to securing justice for those in our community who cannot afford legal representation for civil suits.

I have been an intern, a staff attorney, senior attorney, director of litigation and then became executive director of LSNF in 1994. Being able to experience firsthand the many layers of service that LSNF has provided over the last 38 years helped me to fully understand and appreciate its impact. It also helped me realize the tremendous resources that are required to provide these vital legal services in the 16 counties that we serve.

It takes a significant community investment to ensure justice for all, and this is an investment I plan on continuing to make well beyond my tenure as executive director. It is incredibly rewarding to see the lives we are changing with our commitment to justice, which not only benefits clients but also family members, neighborhoods, and governmental entities. Legal representation is so essential to fulfilling the promise of America that, even in retirement, I plan to continue taking an active role in encouraging others in our community to make an investment in ensuring legal services for all.

It's also why our Board of Directors sought a successor as the next executive director who also has a long-standing history with LSNF and who is a passionate advocate for the individuals and communities we serve. Leslie Powell is just that person.

Leslie has served as the senior attorney of LSNF's Pensacola office. In this role, Leslie's primary areas of practice were housing, consumer law and the representation of victims, including children, those within the dependency system, and victims of domestic and sexual violence. Leslie also serves as a statewide expert in the role of legal services in disaster response and recovery.

Under her leadership, the United Way of Escambia County recognized LSNF as its 2015 Partner Agency of the Year. Leslie and her family have relocated to Tallahassee where she will serve as deputy director of LSNF until my retirement in 2016.

It has been an honor to be intimately involved in shaping the organization and the lives that we are changing every day. It has also been a privilege to solve problems for people courageously facing very difficult life situations.

Over the last 40 years, LSNF has grown from one small office serving Leon County, into one of the most respected legal services agencies in the country providing legal representation and counsel to an average of 7,000 families annually.

Our combined efforts improved the lives of children, senior citizens, victims of domestic violence and families at risk of losing their homes. We improved our communities by reducing the level of crime, preventing deterioration of property values and neighborhoods, enhancing local government tax collections and lessening the demand on other overburdened human service organizations.

It is my privilege to lead this organization of committed attorneys, staff, board members, donors and volunteers. I hope you will continue to join me in the pursuit of justice for all citizens, regardless of their income and resources.

Our Mission

Legal Services of North Florida (LSNF) is a non-profit, 501(c)(3) agency providing civil legal assistance. Our core mission is:

To provide an opportunity for justice for eligible residents through representation conducted efficiently and comparable in quality to that of the private bar and through other forms of legal assistance designed to provide a full range of civil legal services to those in need.

LSNF provides free civil legal services to persons whose adjusted income falls below 125 percent of the federal poverty level, and to specific vulnerable populations who experience problems in the following priority areas:

- Preservation of the home and promotion of home ownership;
- Support for families and children;
- Promotion of employment, economic security and health; and
- Promotion of safety and stability.

2015 Accomplishments

In 2015 LSNF provided a variety of no-cost civil legal services to 5,828 clients.

Our staff and volunteer attorneys obtained 299 injunctions for protection and 55 dissolutions of marriage for victims of violence; obtained relief for 1,010 families allowing them to remain in their homes; and assisted in the preparation of 200 wills and advanced directives.

LSNF also provided other various legal solutions for clients, including recovering social security benefits for clients with disabilities, representing children in the foster care system, providing specialized service to homeless veterans, obtaining financial relief for residents of public housing, and resolving tax controversies for low-income taxpayers.

The result was more than \$1.9 million in one-time benefits and more than \$2.3 million in annualized benefits for our clients.

In 2015, LSNF secured several new specialized grants to provide programs and services to clients and help supplement the reduction in funding and resources from Legal Services Corporation and the Florida Bar Foundation.

Ways to Donate

Planned Giving

Planned gifts are investments in LSNF's future and the services it provides to the low-income individuals in the 16 counties covered. This type of an investment is an opportunity to make a larger donation than your income allows and leave a lasting legacy to the organization. You can make a planned gift by naming LSNF as a beneficiary in your will or bequest, charitable lead or remainder trusts, retirement plans and IRAs or life insurance policies.

Endowment Fund

In 2006, LSNF's Board of Directors and a committee of volunteers created an endowment fund to commemorate LSNF's 30th anniversary. An account was established at the Community Foundation of North Florida from which proceeds from the endowment will continue to grow and sustain our services long into the future.

Partners in Service

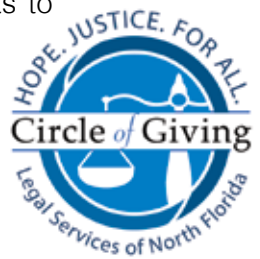

Circle of Giving

In 2014 LSNF established the Circle of Giving to honor those who support LSNF as well as to provide for the financial stability of various programs LSNF provides.

Giving Hope through Services

Legal Services of North Florida provides representation to low-income individuals in civil matters only. Eligibility for assistance may be based on income and assets of all members of the household and the legal problem.

Domestic/Sexual Violence

LSNF provides assistance to adult and child victims of abuse, sexual assault, stalking and human trafficking. Though a broad range of services are available, many of the cases involve securing orders of protection, safety planning and obtaining dissolutions of marriage.

Family

LSNF handles some family law matters where the situation may threaten the security or the viability of a family. LSNF handles the following types of cases: paternity, adoption, name change, and guardianship.

Consumer

LSNF assistance ensures that issues such as debt collection and lending practices are done in a lawful manner. LSNF handles cases such as: bankruptcy, debt collection issues, predatory lending issues, contract issues, and unfair or deceptive sales practices.

Housing

LSNF provides representation to ensure that landlords follow proper procedures in dealing with tenants. LSNF represents tenants with the following types of cases: lease agreement disputes, landlord lockouts, evictions, poor living conditions, and public housing issues. LSNF also represents homeowners facing foreclosure.

Public Benefits

LSNF provides representation in federal and state administrative hearings to protect the basic necessities of life. These may include: Medicaid, Medicare, food stamps, unemployment compensation, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families, FEMA assistance and Agency for Healthcare Administration Managed Care advocacy.

Elder Law

LSNF provides assistance with wills, estate planning, and probate matters in limited situations. Simple estate planning includes beneficiary deeds, powers of attorney, and health care directives. We also provide assistance with guardianships for those who need protection.

Tax Law

LSNF provides representation to low income taxpayers in federal tax controversies and will educate individuals about their rights and responsibilities as U.S. taxpayers. LSNF represents taxpayers with the following types of cases: collection issues, offers-in-compromise, installment agreements, and currently-not-collectible status.

2010 Deepwater Horizon (BP) Oil Spill

LSNF provides representation to help victims with BP oil spill claims issues. LSNF helps people understand their filing options, file an Interim or Final Claim, understand documentation requirements, review settlement offers, interpret the Release of Claims, understand the tax implications of receiving a payment, and address other issues that come up in the claims process.

Clinics/Helpline

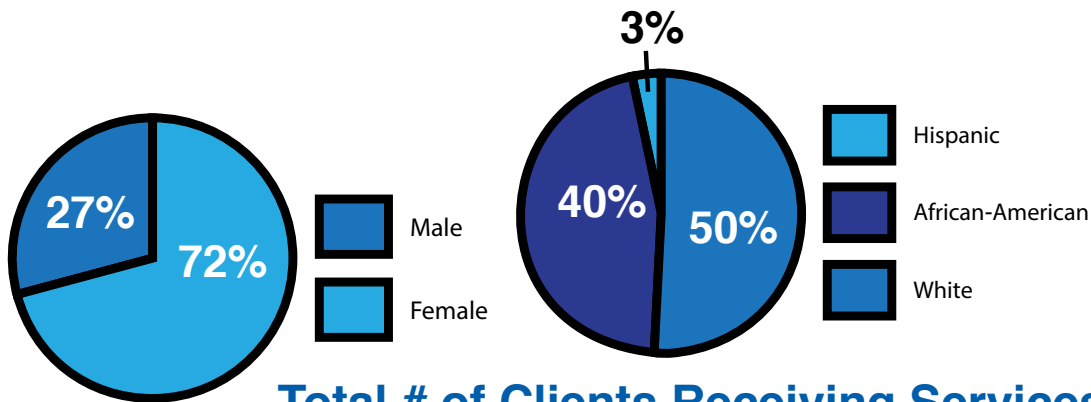
LSNF provides various legal clinics and a telephone legal advice helpline supported and facilitated by both LSNF staff and volunteer lawyers to assist hard-to-serve populations such as homebound, elderly, rural residents, as well as day and evening workers. LSNF clinics and helpline cover a variety of topics including: agency information, family, consumer, housing, public benefits, and elder law.

Family Law Assistance Program

The Family Law Assistance Program (FLAP) assists people who are filing and responding to family law actions without an attorney. Form packets and instructions are available for purchase in Gadsden County only. Form reviews are also available. FLAP staff cannot give legal advice.

Education/Outreach

LSNF provides public education and outreach services to partnering agencies and community groups upon request. LSNF covers a variety of topics including: agency information, domestic/sexual violence, family, consumer, housing, public benefits, and elder law.

Private Attorney Involvement – PAI

LSNF works closely with private attorneys throughout our 16-county service area to provide legal assistance to low-income individuals. Through the Private Attorney Involvement (PAI) Program this cooperation takes several forms, including coordinating volunteer attorney resources of time and/or financial support. Over 900 attorneys make up LSNF's support pool. More than 560 of these lawyers contributed over \$175,000. In addition, pro bono attorneys provided over 5,315 hours of service in 2015. This is the equivalent of \$1,062,950 worth of legal services.

A large part of client assistance continues to come from volunteers at our telephone legal advice helpline. We are grateful to our partners at the Department of Business and Professional Regulation, Department of Transportation, and the City of Tallahassee Attorney's office for encouraging their attorneys to participate in this important program for so many years

Volunteer Recognition

The work of volunteers is a vital part of LSNF's effort to succeed in its mission. Each year LSNF recognizes its volunteers by publishing in area newspapers the names of lawyers who contributed time and other resources. Additionally, in the 1st and 2nd Judicial Circuits, LSNF holds a Pro Bono Week and Law Week Celebration reception each October and May to honor all volunteer attorneys in their respective circuits.

Challenges

Our staff is one of Legal Services of North Florida's most valuable resources. To maintain consistently high quality client services, it is imperative to keep well-qualified and dedicated attorneys, paralegals, and support staff who are committed to making a difference in people's lives. Towards that end, we strive to expand our community support by helping the business and private community understand the role of legal services in the quality of life for all and to educate and inform leaders, philanthropists, politicians, business people, and residents about how integral LSNF is to a safe and healthy community.

Pro Bono Awards

Each year, LSNF participates in The Florida Bar President's Pro Bono Service Award nomination process in the 1st, 2nd and 14th Judicial Circuits, putting forth names of deserving volunteer attorneys for consideration for this important recognition. The awards were established in 1981 and intended to encourage lawyers to volunteer free legal services to the poor by recognizing those who make public service commitments and to raise public awareness of the substantial volunteer services provided by Florida lawyers.

In 2015, U.S. Rep. Message from Director of Litigation - Scott Manion



This year, as many stimulus programs disappeared, we saw a greater number of individuals struggling to stay in their homes, facing eviction or foreclosure, being challenged by illnesses without access to medical insurance, and experiencing a greater number of benefits cuts.

In recent years, we have seen a growing number of individuals in need of civil legal services as a result of limited unemployment benefits, coupled with numerous cuts in services to our most vulnerable children, the mentally ill and persons with disabilities.

Due to these circumstances, we see many more emergency cases on a daily basis. In some offices, we averaged as many as 10 foreclosures per week, with even more clients needing our help navigating online systems to access programs and services. Other clients benefit from LSNF's help applying for food stamps and medical assistance.

More than ever attorneys are invaluable to clients that need advice and to maximize the value of the programs and services still available.

Moving forward we will continue to enlist more assistance from pro bono attorneys and other community partners, in addition to seeking out more sources of funds to support our staff efforts.

The next 10 years will also see an increase in the number of retirees as an increasing number of Baby Boomers reach retirement age, with an increased demand for services and more individuals relying on legal advocates to preserve their assets.

The following stories provide a look at some of the individuals and families LSNF attorneys helped throughout the last year. They also remind us of the significance of LSNF's mission and highlight the tireless work of our talented and dedicated legal staff and volunteers.

In 2015, LSNF served 5,828 people -- these are a few of their stories (All names are fictitious.):

HOPE

Adoption hearings are usually joyous affairs and this case was no exception, even though it involved the biological parents voluntarily surrendering their parental rights. Eleven year old Alana had been with her paternal grandparents since her mother two years before asked them to pick her up.

Had the grandparents not taken her in, she would most likely have ended up in foster care.



The mother never asked for the little girl to be returned, so when the paternal grandmother asked her about adoption, she was in favor of it. The father, who had left Florida about a year before, was accessible and also agreed to sign a consent for the adoption.

The grandparents, who are now the parents, are seeking to enroll their new daughter in a better school than the one she attends in the rural county in which they live. The girl will be eligible to collect benefits from her father's social security disability account, which will help this family maintain a secure financial future.

JUSTICE

Jane was born and raised in Leon County. After being employed by the same company for 30 years, she was fired because she was disabled and could no longer perform her job duties. Without a job and disabled, she was unable to make the monthly payments on her home and risked losing it.

A pastor from a local church suggested she contact Legal Services of North Florida. Jane applied for legal assistance and quickly learned her home was in jeopardy of being taken from her and, only by filing bankruptcy, would she be able to stop the bank from seizing her home.

LSNF immediately filed the bankruptcy and, at the same time, helped Jane apply for Social Security disability and disability retirement. While LSNF was able to stop the home from being taken from Jane, she still needed some source of income moving forward. It was coming down to the wire when LSNF won both her claims for social security and retirement disability.

Unfortunately for Jane, her health was taking a turn for the worse. She had been suffering from a severe tooth infection, depression, and a series of mini-strokes that required LSNF to step in, once more, to ensure she obtained the medical insurance she needed to help stabilize her health. With the medical insurance she obtained with LSNF's help, Jane finally got her medical conditions treated. LSNF is now in the process of getting her a loan modification in order to save her home permanently.

FOR ALL

More than 10 inches of wind-driven rain fell in one night upon an already saturated ground in Baker, Florida. The rain pelted the roof of Jeffrey's mobile home, and the waters rose up above the floor level. Jeffrey was left with a leaky roof and a door that wouldn't close. As time went on, mold inevitably began to grow and spread throughout his home. Jeffrey, a 69-year-old man who is both deaf and mute and had only begun to learn American Sign Language within the past few years, did not know what to do. His neighbors, who have known him most of his life, stepped in and helped him file a FEMA claim. Eventually, disaster case managers from the Alabama-West Florida Conference United Methodist Church (AWFCUMC) also stepped in and referred him to Legal Services of North Florida (LSNF).

Upon investigation, LSNF learned, not only was Jeffrey a flood survivor, but he also was the victim of fraud. A person claiming to be a family member had been taking advantage of his situation for years—tricking him into quitclaiming his interest in his property to her, receiving and improperly spending his social security benefits after his father's death, and failing to provide him necessary medical care. Because his property was not titled in his name, disaster case managers were unable to provide him the repair assistance he so desperately needed.

LSNF worked with Jeffrey and his friends and neighbors and learned that his father had left a will leaving the entire interest in the property to him. LSNF initiated a probate action, transferring the title from his father to him. LSNF then filed a quiet title action, which resulted in the alleged relative claiming all interest back to him. With title to his property cleared, AWFCUMC provided funds and recruited volunteer labor to completely renovate Jeffrey's mobile home.

While the property interests were pending, LSNF gathered evidence and presented it to the Social Security Administration (SSA) regarding Jeffrey's misappropriated benefits. After its investigation, SSA agreed that the representative payee should be removed. Jeffrey requested that his neighbor, who has been caring for him for almost 20 years, be named representative payee, and she has been making sure he has all that he needs for a comfortable, healthy life.

Where does your funding come from?

LSNF is funded from a variety of public and private sources. Our largest funder is the Legal Services Corporation (LSC) which is funded by Congress. Additionally we receive Interest on Trust Accounts' funds from the Florida Bar Foundation. We also have a variety of governmental grants which help fund our domestic violence programs, representation of children and low-income taxpayer clinics. We receive funds from 14 of our counties derived from ordinances in accord with a legislative mandate. The remainder of our funding comes from other governmental and private grants, the United Way, private contributions and fundraising events.

Are you a state or governmental agency?

No, we are a private not-for-profit agency.

How many lawyers do you have?

Over the 16 counties we serve, we have 16 staff attorneys and over 340 volunteer lawyers.

What is the composition of your board?

Our board is comprised of representatives of the various attorney groups throughout our region and one third is comprised of client members, who represent various agencies serving the poverty community.

How do individuals get services from LSNF?

Potential clients are either referred by another agency or the courts, or come to us on their own. They apply for services and within one week are notified if we will handle their case. The cases are assigned to LSNF attorneys, paralegals or volunteer attorneys.

What is the criteria for accepting a client?

Our primary client base is restricted to an adjusted income of 125% of the federal poverty guidelines. Several of our grant sources have varying income requirements. The domestic violence grants do not have an income criteria because so many victims are situationally poor. All cases must be civil in nature and adhere to our priorities.

What is the difference between you and Legal Aid of Tallahassee and Emerald Coast Legal Aid?

Legal Aid of Tallahassee provides services through volunteer attorneys, almost exclusively in Leon County. Emerald Coast Legal Aid provides services through staff attorneys primarily in the areas of Social Security, juvenile and family law, almost exclusively in Escambia and Santa Rosa Counties. LSNF provides services through staff and volunteer attorneys throughout 16 North Florida counties. In 2014 in Escambia and Santa Rosa Counties, LSNF focused primarily on consumer, housing, domestic and sexual violence issues, tax controversies and children's issues.
